

The All-age Community Hub

Waldo Williams suite

The All-age Community Hub offers a warm and welcoming space to have time out from Yearly Meeting. From our youngest to our oldest Yearly Meeting participants, everyone is welcome. It will be cheerful during the lunchtimes as families with small children are likely to be in the space – do come and join in!

The All-age Community Hub will include opportunities to complete jigsaws and puzzles, to knit and to quilt, to draw and to write, and to have quiet conversations this may offer different ways of approaching the questions we are facing together during Yearly Meeting 2025. This can be part of our radical witness for peace and inspire everyday activism. It is an opportunity to create something practical and help strengthen our community and our commitment to peace.

Quiet Room

Benjamin Lay 1

The Quiet Room (on the second floor) may be used for quiet worship, sitting or lying down quietly, or quiet activity (e.g. knitting).

Quaker Centre Worship Space

The Worship Space (in the bookshop) is also available for quiet worship and sitting quietly.

Overflow Room

The Overflow Room is a space where you can watch Yearly Meeting sessions live without being in the Large Meeting House. You can use this space if you are late, or if you are only able to attend part of a session, or if you need to move around, lie down, or be in a space with fewer people.

The Library

The Library will be open on Friday 23 May, 14:00–19:00 and then throughout the weekend, during the breaks between and after sessions. You are welcome to come in to browse the shelves, talk to staff or look at our displays and resources.

The Library will be used for the fairs on Saturday and Sunday lunchtimes and for the re-launch of *Dining with diplomats, praying with gunmen* on Monday lunchtime.

Please note that we will not be able to bring up archival material from the basement strongrooms during the weekend. If you have some specific research you would like to do, or if you would like to bring any items to add to the collections, please contact the Library before Yearly Meeting to discuss this.

Toilet facilities at Friends House

The following toilet facilities are available at Friends House during Yearly Meeting 2025. We are sharing this information in order to ensure that those attending understand the facilities available and feel sure that there are facilities they can use.

All our public facilities are trans inclusive. This means that toilets labelled with a 'female' sign are intended for women, trans women, and non-binary and intersex people for whom this toilet is the best aligned with their lived experience. Toilets labelled with a 'male' sign are intended for men, trans men, and non-binary and intersex people for whom this toilet is the best aligned with their lived experience.

Basement:

Accessible facilities: There is one accessible facility with a private basin and a baby changing facility. Self-contained cubicle: one self-contained cubicle which has a toilet, basin and hand-dryer.

Ground Floor:

Women's facilities: This area has 18 toilet cubicles, a shared handwashing area, and baby changing facilities. Men's facilities: This area has six toilet cubicles, a shared urinal and handwashing area, and baby changing facilities.

Accessible facilities: There are two accessible facilities on the ground floor with private washbasins. One of them also has a shower.

First Floor:

Toilets on this floor are reserved for children and young people during Yearly Meeting. They are not available to adults.

Second Floor:

There are seven self-contained cubicles on the second-floor landing. Each cubicle has a toilet, basin and hand-dryer. One of these is an accessible facility. These can be used by anybody attending Yearly Meeting.

This is a meeting space for lesbian, gay, bisexual, asexual, intersex, transgender and gender non-binary Quakers who are members of Quaker Rainbow or identify with it.

Quaker Women Survivors of Childhood Sexual Abuse*

Sunday 25 May 14:00–14:45, Margaret Fell

This session is for women who have experienced sexual abuse as children. It will offer mutual support and a chance to be among people who have had similar experiences. Broadly the group is run as a meeting for worship with a support function. It will be facilitated in a way that is sensitive and accommodating but it is not therapy.

Outdoor silent witness* Monday 26 May, 11:30-12:30

Before lunch on Monday, we will hold an outdoor silent witness to communicate our message of peace to the world. We will start together in the Large Meeting House at 11:30, after which we will move in silence to stand around the outside of Friends House.

We will have printed postcards with our peace message that Friends can hand to passers-by. Friends House will provide posters and banners. Friends will be invited to create their own personalised messages of peace to the world and an inward message of peace to themselves in the All-age Community Hub earlier during the weekend.

The witness will last for 30 minutes. Everyone is very welcome to join the witness for the full time or for just a few minutes, or to come and go. The witness will include Friends House Garden, where there will be chairs set out so people who feel more comfortable

The trend towards militarised responses means that 2025 opened with more armed conflicts than at any time since the second world war. 

Quakers share a way of life, not a set of beliefs. Quaker unity is based on shared understanding and a shared practice of silent worship – a communal stillness.

Quakers seek to experience God directly – internally, in relationships with others, and with the world. Local meetings for worship are open to all who wish to attend.

Quakers try to live with honesty and integrity. This means speaking truth to all, including people in positions of power. The Quaker commitment to peace arises from the conviction that love is at the heart of existence and that all human beings are unique and equal.

This leads Quakers to put faith into action by working locally and globally to change the systems that cause injustice and violent conflict.
